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What “high-impact TA” looks like

- Solves a real national priority
- **Is owned by national actors**
- **Is implemented through effective coordination**
- Produces actionable outputs
- Creates pathways for replication, scale-up, and transformational impact



- **Stakeholder engagement** is integral to design and implementation.
- It translates to country ownership, clear governance and accountability, ability to adjust during implementation and open feedback channels



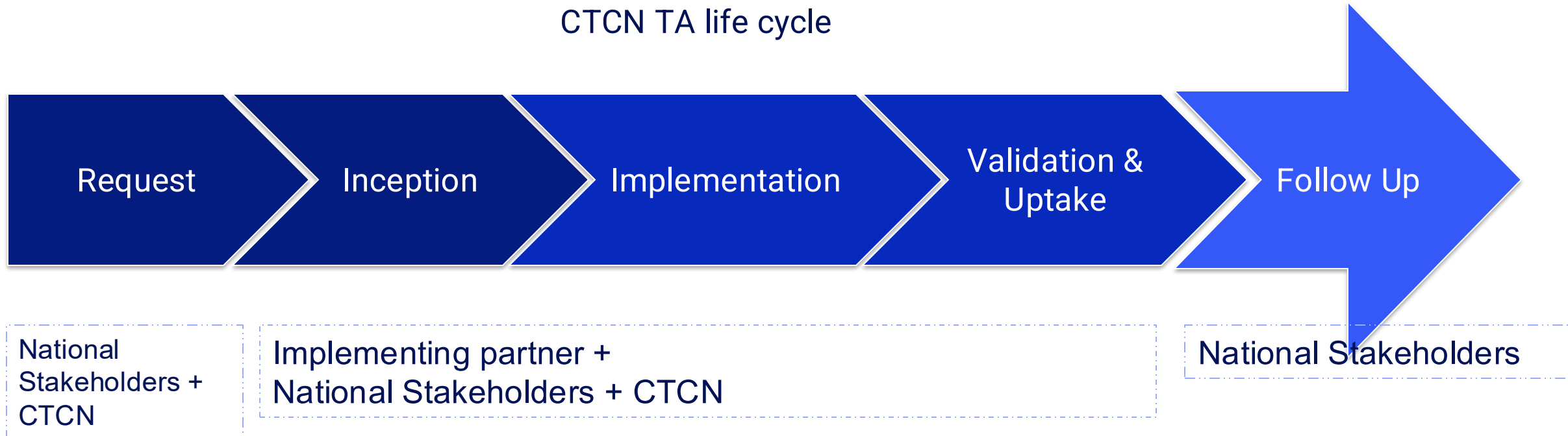
Key Factors for high-impact TA coordination

- Early stakeholder mapping
- **A functioning steering committee**
- Clear decision points and timelines
- Regular communication and reporting
- Inclusion of the right technical and institutional actors
- Adaptive management when realities change
- A clear pathway for uptake and follow-on action



Stakeholder engagement for results throughout TA implementation

CTCN TA life cycle



Understanding the roles of each stakeholder

Actor	Core role during implementation
CTCN	Quality assurance, process stewardship, troubleshooting, strategic oversight
Implementing partner	Technical delivery, work planning, facilitation, reporting, risk flagging
NDE	Country ownership, convening power , strategic alignment, escalation when needed
Project proponent	Day-to-day counterpart, technical inputs, access to data, validation and uptake

Common coordination pitfalls

- **Inactive steering committee**
- **Too many actors, no clear focal point**
- Late comments and delayed validation
- Weak engagement of decision-makers
- Stakeholder fatigue from one-way consultations

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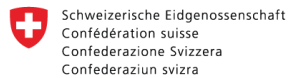
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
