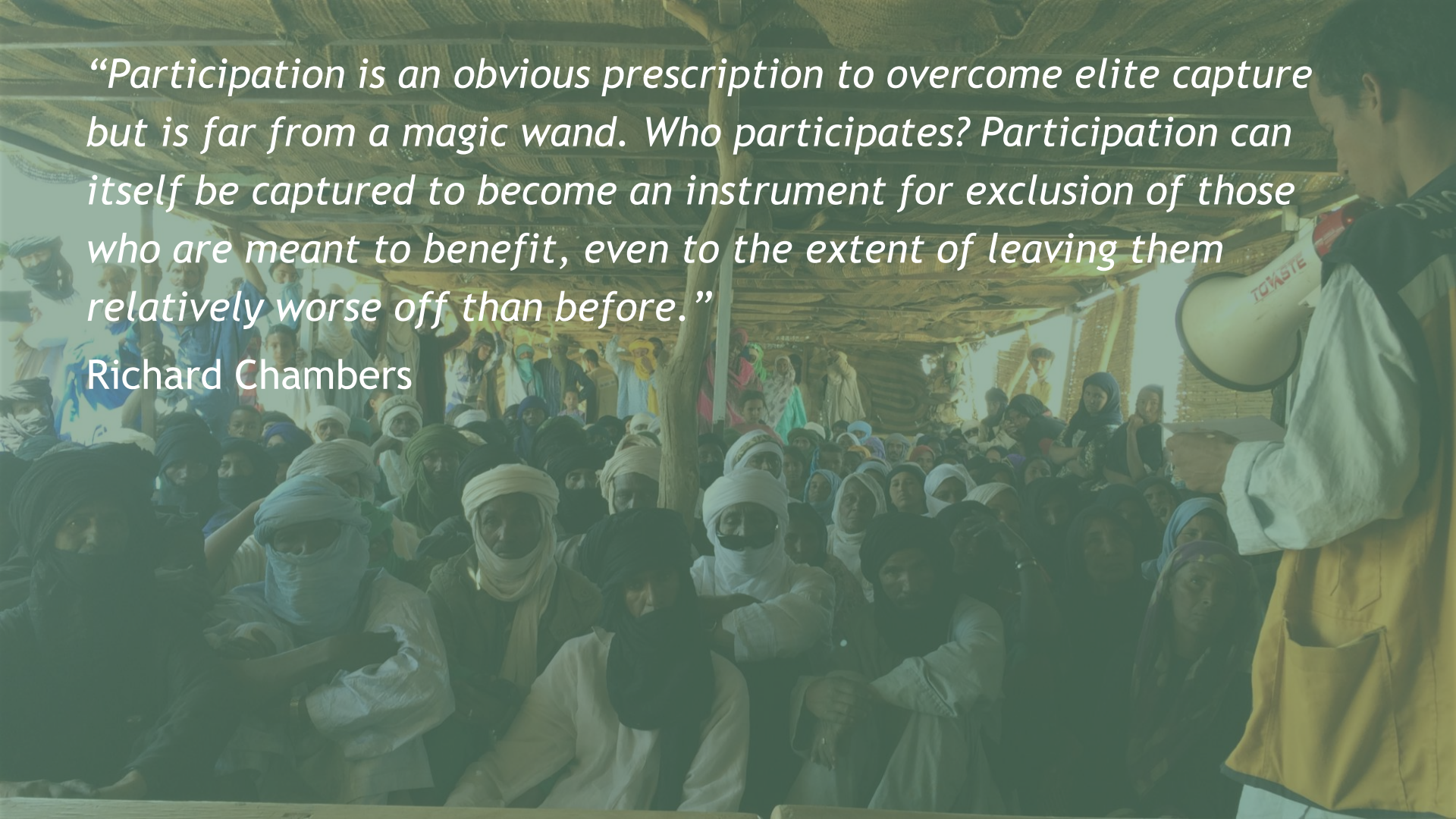

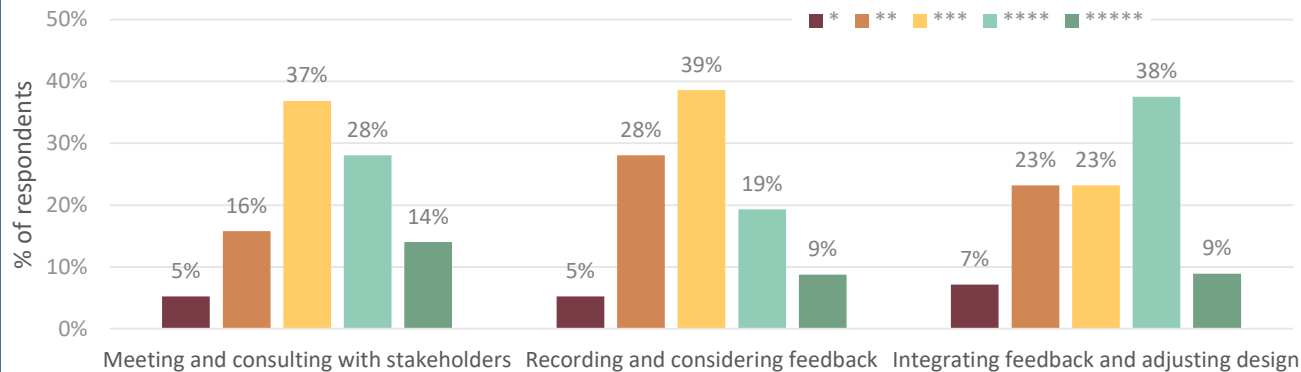

GCF insight - Spotlight on stakeholder engagement

72 respondents from National Designated Authorities (NDAs) and Accredited Entities

25% of respondents do not design beneficiary engagement from the start of project preparation, but rather allow this to evolve or be driven by the host country.
