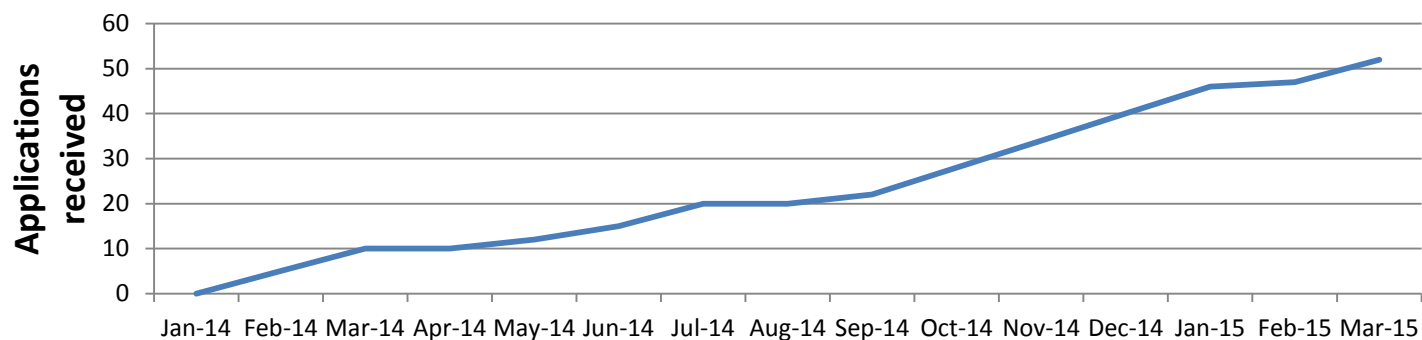


Overview

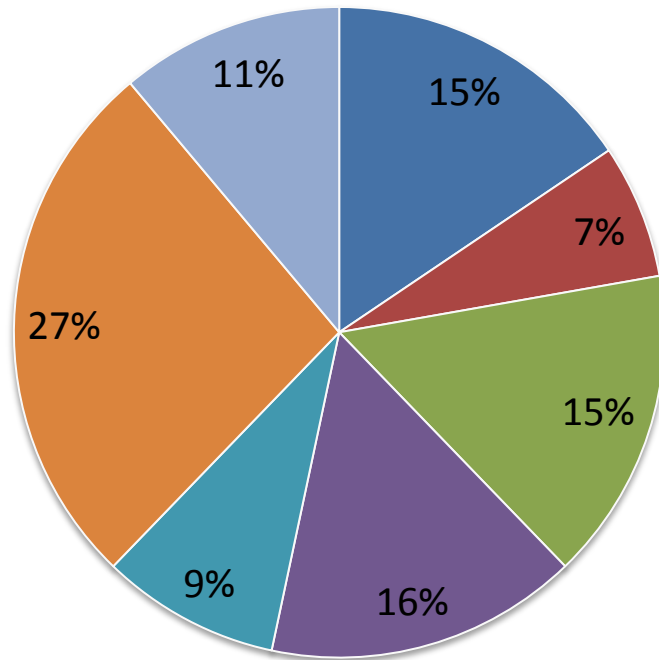
as of 23 March 2015:

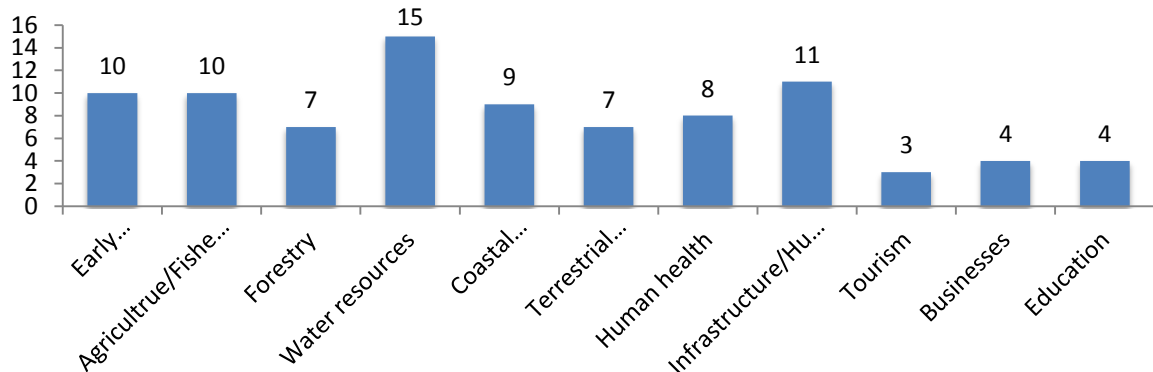
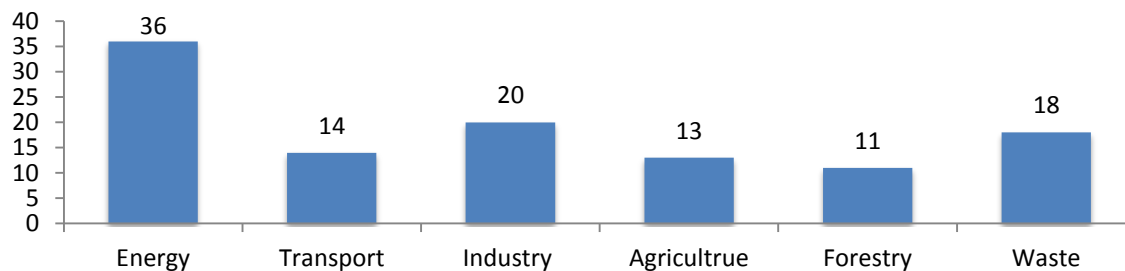
Types of Institution

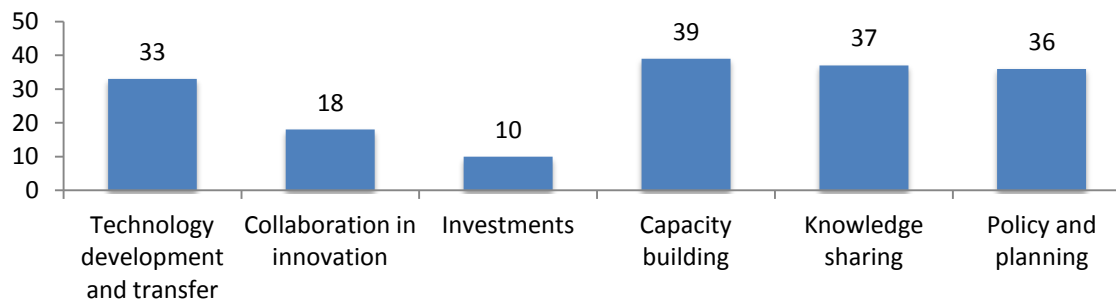
Expertise by Sector and Service Type

- 1. Provide technical assistance to developing countries to enhance transfer of climate technologies**
- 2. Provide and share information and knowledge on climate technologies**
- 3. Foster collaboration and networking with various stakeholders on climate technologies**

1 Providing Technical Assistance

Technical Assistance Request-Response process

- **“Response projects” (valued up to USD250,000) normally tendered to Network members**

- **Network members notified about requests**
 - Via website
 - Via email

- **Network members express interest to participate in competitive bidding process to respond to request**
 - Bidder’s package
 - Anticipate mostly private sector oriented organizations will participate

2 Sharing Information and Knowledge

- **Providing and sharing information on climate technologies**
 - Knowledge Management System (KMS) is primary vehicle for gathering and disseminating resources

- **Sharing knowledge**
 - Contribute to dynamic services such as webinars, online trainings, expert technical assistance, etc.

- **Contributing to capacity building and training**
 - CTCN events such as NDE regional meetings and workshops

- **Anticipate that most Network members of all institutional types will contribute in this manner**

3 Foster Collaboration and Networking

- **Network members collaborate with CTCN and other stakeholders to generate awareness**
 - Collaborate at international and regional events
 - Share and link communication channels such as to CTCN's website and social media accounts
 - Share CTCN brochures and outreach materials

- **Network members engage in networking activities to strengthen networks, partnerships, and capacity building for climate technology transfer**
 - Join the CTCN in international, regional, and in-country networking activities that will support, catalyse, and develop programmes for developing countries

Network Member Communications

- **CTCN will provide regular updates to Network members on its progress and actions**
 - Updates via emails, newsletters, and event notifications
 - CTCN website and social media accounts

- **CTCN will provide outreach support materials to Network members**
 - Brochures, PowerPoint presentations

Overview criteria

The applicant shall...

1. Have a **legitimate institutional structure** (NDEs are de facto members of the CTN)
2. Have a demonstrated **capability** in initiatives aimed at development, transfer and deployment of climate technologies applicable for developing countries including **expertise** in policy, capacity building and/or investment
3. Have **demonstrated operational and organizational stability**, as evidenced by financial, human and other resources relative to their mandate and size that could reasonably be deemed sufficient to deliver the organization's mandate
4. Pledge and comply with the **CTCN Code of Conduct**

Observations, challenges, and measures taken

Institutional setup

- Encourages applications from established institutions
- List of institutions imperfect
- Additional clarity provided in application

Capacity

- Means to gain information on capacity and expertise of Network Members
- Emphasis on Technical Assistance
- Revise application to capture capacity for ‘stimulating collaboration’

Operational and organizational stability

- Perceived stringent, potentially limiting participation of smaller and/or newer organizations and or those from LDCs, associations/initiatives
- Clarifications on requirements in application

Ethical conduct

- Continues to ensure the members’ commitment to and awareness of the Code of Conduct

Membership validity

- The 2-year membership validity was defined in the guiding principles of the Network (2nd Advisory Board meeting) “***Membership in the CTN is merit-based and time-bound***”
- Concerns raised at 4th Advisory Board meeting as possibly consisting a “barrier” to Network expansion
- Alternative is being sought and will be proposed at 6th Advisory Board meeting
- Validity of membership registered before 31 December 2015 will not expire before 31 December 2017
